### District Digest (Jan & Feb)

West Oxfordshire District Council would like to hear from residents who have taken advantage of the concessionary travel scheme introduced earlier this year. It was launched in April across England to entitle anyone over 60 to a free pass to travel on all local bus networks in the country. The Council is interested to find out how people have used their passes and is particularly keen to hear from anyone who has an interesting or quirky story to tell – perhaps they had never travelled by bus before receiving a pass, or maybe they have visited places they had never seen before getting a pass, or perhaps they have rekindled friendships thanks to the pass, or even met new friends on their travels. ### Get £700 off your Council Tax

WODC is running a prize draw to give householders the chance to get their Council Tax bill cut by £700. One lucky winner will be picked at random to receive the £700 discount on next year's bill. This is equivalent to getting your Council Tax paid for six months if you live in a Band D property in West Oxfordshire. The draw has been organised to encourage more people to pay their Council Tax by safe, secure Direct Debit, which helps save money

and keep Council Tax bills down. All householders who pay their Council Tax by Direct Debit will automatically be entered into the free draw. The winner was due to be picked on 20 January.

### Final Flood Report published

The District Council has published its Final Flood Report, setting out what has been done since the July 2007 floods and future actions to alleviate flooding in West Oxfordshire. The Final Flood Report is the culmination of an in-depth investigation by the Council into the summer 2007 floods, which affected more than 1,600 homes and 72 businesses in the District. The Council has already produced an Interim Flood Report and individual Parish Flood Reports for the areas across the District that were affected by the floods, with the aim of helping to identify the cause of the flooding, who is responsible, what work is being carried out, and what the potential options are for future mitigation and who might fund this work.

This Final Flood Report pulls together all the key information, a summary of actions taken to date and, most importantly, a programme of works for the future. As well as outlining the Council's responsibilities regarding flooding and mitigation work, the report also highlights the responsibilities of other key agencies, such as the Environment Agency, Oxfordshire County Council and Thames Water. The Council has been working closely with all relevant agencies on the issue of flooding and believes this and its other reports will help everyone involved to plan for the future. In addition to the Final Flood Report, work is currently being finalised on a Strategic Flood Risk Assessment, which will be used alongside the flood reports to inform future strategic planning.

Cllr David Harvey, Cabinet Member for Environment, said: 'A huge amount of work has gone into this report, and we will continue to work hard on this issue. We are one of only half a dozen or so councils in Britain to have gone into the level of detail contained in this and the Strategic Flood Risk Assessment. This will help us immensely, not only on future planning issues, but also in lobbying organizations such as the Environment Agency, County Council, Thames Water and riparian landowners, to enable us to protect as many home-owners and businesses in West Oxfordshire as we can.'

As with all previous reports, the Final Flood Report will be passed on to key agencies such as the Environment Agency, as well as the District's MP, the Rt Hon David Cameron. All of the reports are available for residents to view online at www.westoxon.gov.uk/floodreports. Copies are also available at the Council's Elmfield Offices in New Yatt Road, Witney, at the Town Centre Shop in Witney and at the Guildhall, Chipping Norton.

### Meeting in December 2008

Two members of the public attended the meeting – our regular attendee Cliff Godfrey and the Primary School's head teacher, Mrs Susie Bagnall.

Parking on Laughton Hill was once again a topic of the Public Forum slot. After much lively discussion, it was agreed that those who were inconvenienced by thoughtless parking should alert the police.

Mrs Bagnall was introduced to Council by the Chairman, who had been invited to the school to lunch with the children and to inspect the new facilities. He noted that the whole atmosphere in the school had changed since his last visit. There was a palpable feeling of direction and friendship between children and staff; the school was quiet and focussed with a high degree of confident application. Mrs. Bagnall outlined her approach to education in general and the leadership of the school in particular. In summarising her aims for Stonesfield Primary School, she mentioned her three goals for all children in her care:

- children should become successful learners:
- they should be confident individuals;
- they should learn to be responsible citizens.

In these aims were the bones of a successful and happy school. She also described the way in which the new building had added to the facilities for the children, bringing in an increased perspective for them and giving them added opportunities to participate in the wider world. In all, Susie Bagnall showed herself to be a thoughtful and inspiring head with a wealth of experience to supplement her obvious enthusiasm for the advancement of education in Stonesfield. The Chairman mentioned the newly appointed priest-in-charge for Stonesfield & Combe, who is very keen to play an active part in the school and would be an asset in many ways. Mrs Bagnall agreed and stated her hope that the connections between the school, the church and other village groups would be strengthened. The children had already visited the Darby & Joan club and were anticipating a choral visit to the Lunch Club before Christmas.

Council extended a very warm welcome to the new incumbent, priest-in-charge Revd Roy Turner, and felt sure that he and his wife, Bev, would give an added dimension to the work of the church in Stonesfield.

Our County Councillor, Sue Haffenden, reported that the long-term future of Cogges Farm Museum looked to be secure; County was in process of setting up a Trust which will come into being in 2012. In the meantime its subsidy to Cogges would continue. Sue also informed Council that the Stagecoach bus service 20a had received a National Award for public transport in a rural setting.

The Chairman thanked all Councillors for their hard work throughout the year.

#### Meeting in January 2009

At its first meeting of the New Year, the Chairman wished all Councillors and all Stonesfield residents a happy, healthy and prosperous year ahead.

Several residents of The Tewer were present and there was lively discussion of the perceived problems of parking on Laughton Hill. Council asserted plainly that the only two viable solutions were i) an amicable and mutually acceptable agreement between the parties involved, and ii) for the residents to request that the Highways Dept. of Oxford County Council convene a site meeting. Of these, the best and most likely to succeed is the consensus agreement.

The Chairman of the Village Hall Committee, Sarah Plumridge, outlined the disgraceful vandalism and theft of property which had taken place on New Year's Eve. The Folk Dance Club, long established users of the Village Hall, had its party completely disrupted and ruined by theft of food, money and valuables from several handbags, and the theft of car keys and car. Although still unproven, it would appear that the vandals could include youths, including several girls, from neighbouring villages who see Stonesfield as a soft touch because there is no regular police presence here. The Village Hall Committee intend to request

an interview with senior Thames Valley Police Officers, and Council agreed unanimously to give them the strongest support possible. It would appear that miscreants from elsewhere have been 'moved on' by police from their own patches and have consequently gathered in our village.

As if this were not enough, a report was also received of the first mugging in Stonesfield in recent times. A lady was mugged for her shoulder-bag and it was only the fact that she was trained in self-defence that prevented serious injury and theft. What is happening to our seemingly peaceful and pleasant village? The Village Hall Committee is intending to call a village meeting to try to find a remedy and a way forward. Council will support this move and urges all villagers with a sense of community to attend.

It was noted that the tree on The Cross would be pruned and made safe sometime in January.

Sue Haffenden reported on the start of the Budget discussions which will determine our Council Tax for the ensuing year. Several factors in the economic situation affecting our country will have a bearing on these discussions. For example, the reduction in house building in the County will adversely affect receipts from the Council tax. However, the greatly reduced rate of interest from investments may well lead to a decision to use some reserves to preserve amenities.

### Planning application

(discussed at extra meeting on 30 Dec) Austin's Meadow, Churchfields; erection of detached dwelling. No objection. It was agreed that an interview would be held for the permanent post of Clerk to the Parish Council prior to the next meeting of Council.

#### Owl Rescue

Last year proved to be very busy for us with over twenty-five injured owls and birds of prey either collected by us from vets and members of the public or actually being rescued from a call out. We are now on the Emergency Services callout list as we provide a twenty-four hour rescue service.

The Barn Owl that came to us last March with a broken wing has at last moulted out and is ready to be released, weather permitting; this has been the longest we have had to keep a wild injured owl but it is a remarkable success story and the owl is still very wild. Thanks must go to the Hook Norton Veterinary Surgeons who spent lots of time helping me with

this owl and also to my friend Sally-Anne who looked after the owl in an aviary for me until it became fit and well. Hopefully this owl will breed this year as its partner has visited it every night at the aviary.

Already in the first week of this year we have rescued a Barn Owl from a farm in Freeland. It was very ill and weak, and although I spent most of the night with it giving it critical care, it died the next afternoon. We like to think we can save everything but the sad truth is that for every one we save, three don't make it.

A first for us was being called out to a house in Hazelmere, near High Wycombe, by a couple who came back from California to find a Tawny Owl in their fireplace, having fallen down the chimney. When we arrived and took the front cover off of the fireplace the owl was nowhere to be seen but John had the bright idea of putting his camera inside the chimney and taking a photograph. We had to laugh when we looked at the picture and saw the owl peering down from a ledge about three feet up. We eventually managed to get the owl down and grab its feet before it could fly around the couple's living room, where not only would it have caused considerable damage, it would have plastered everything in soot. I have never seen such a black, sooty owl, everything in the living room was white so we breathed a sigh of relief when we got the owl under control. After I had checked the owl for any injury we released it into the wood at the back of the house

I would like to thank everyone who continues to support us in 2009. We have

been overwhelmed by the support we have received and the interest shown in what we do. Again this year I want to donate five owl nesting boxes and some kestrel nesting boxes locally, so if you have somewhere suitable please contact me so that we can come and look and hopefully site one. 2008 proved to be a bad year for Barn Owls, Tawny Owls and Kestrels: the Kestrel used to be Britain's most common bird of prey but is in serious decline, due to loss of habitat and a shortage of suitable food. The most important thing is suitable habitat for these birds. If the habitat goes so does the food source and that means the birds do not survive.

Field margins and set-aside play a big part in the survival of our owls and birds of prey, providing them with a place to hunt and also a place for many of our ground-nesting birds to nest and rear their young. We humans should respect this and not use these valuable places to walk our dogs, ride our horses or as a recreation ground. Most farmers are aware of the value of these areas and permission should always be obtained as a matter of courtesy before you go on to private land.

We shall be inspecting the nest boxes we donated last year in the next couple of weeks and cleaning them ready for the breeding season. Tawny Owls are the first of our native owls to breed and will be pairing up now. I would like to remind everyone that Tawny Owlets leave the nest long before they can fly and they do fall out of trees. DO NOT PICK THEM UP PLEASE. They will climb back into the tree by using their sharp talons and beaks and their parents will still feed them even

if they are on the ground. If you think they need placing out of danger this is fine as long as it is not far from where you find them. If you think the owlet is injured or not being fed, then before you bring it to us mark the spot where you found it so that we can return it when it is fit to go back. If you find a Barn Owlet on the ground then this is more serious as it must be returned to the nest; the parents will not feed it. Please do not try to do this on your own as it is a dangerous task and you run the risk of being attacked by the parents.

We are still happy to receive old towels and any pet carriers you no longer need as these are very valuable to us; thanks to everyone who donated these items to us last year. We would also like to say a big thank you to Stanton Harcourt Primary School for their generous donation to our rescue. We have purchased two large heat pads with the money which will save us having to borrow them from the vets when we need them. We enjoyed our visit to the school and the children thoroughly enjoyed meeting our owls. We are hoping to raise enough money this year to purchase another hospital box so if anyone out there wants to help us fund-raise then give us a call.

Over the last couple of months we have had problems with people parking across our driveway. Our neighbours are aware of the fact that our gateway is in use 24 hours a day. If we get called out we will not go looking for the owner of the vehicle blocking our access, we will call the police and the vehicle will be towed away. This will also result in the owner of the vehicle being fined £60; we do not want this to happen so please do not

obstruct our gateway; it is an offence to park by a dropped curb and obstruct someone's entrance.


