Stonesfield Voluntary Transport Scheme – second year report

This free scheme exists to provide people who live in Stonesfield with a means of getting to the doctors and other medical surgeries and clinics in Woodstock, Charlbury, Kidlington, Long Hanborough and Witney whenever they do not have easy access to private and public transport. It takes people to and from the Water Eaton Park & Ride to allow them to get the bus to the JR Hospital, but it does not extend to any Oxford or Banbury hospitals.

The scheme is filling a need and its format remains unchanged. This year the number of trips made went up to 76 from 17 the year before.

Woodstock Neighbourhood Management update

Speeding

Over the past month the neighbourhood team has carried out a number of speed enforcement checks throughout the area, including along the A4095 at Bladon, Woodstock Road in Stonesfield, Wroslyn Road in Freeland and the A44 in Woodstock at the Churchill Gate junction.

In Woodstock 245 vehicles were checked with five over the limit. In Bladon, near to the junction with Manor Road, 190 vehicles were checked and five were found to be exceeding the limit. In Stonesfield 165 vehicles were checked and six were found to be over the limit.

Details of all the drivers found exceeding the speed limit were recorded and a warning letter will be sent to them. If they are caught again they will face prosecution.

Youth facilities

The youth centre in Woodstock is still awaiting planning permission for the new build and is currently closed for the summer holidays. Stonesfield Parish Council is to be approached by the neighbourhood team with a view to providing a youth facility in the village. A number of teenage residents have asked if either a shelter or graffiti wall could be provided as there is nothing in their area at the moment.

Other news

There have been 30 offences recorded during the month of July across the neighbourhood. Of these there were nine thefts, four assaults, three burglaries, three criminal damages and four domestic related incidents.

There have been nine thefts this month and a number of these involved personal items being taken from public places, where offenders have either entered private areas or removed property that was unattended. In one of these incidents a purse and wallet were taken from clothing that was left unattended. I would urge the public to pay special attention to their property while out in hotels or pubs. These are places targeted due to the fact that often customers take off jackets and leave them on backs of chairs or on coat hooks with valuables in them. Vehicles are also targeted where valuables have been left on display.

Stonesfield Players Airschwimming

The flyer said: 'Airschwimming is a play about two women incarcerated in a hospital for the criminally insane. Come and see it, it only lasts two hours.' Well, the Village Hall was packed on both nights and those that were there were treated to fantastic performances. By the end of a heartwarming, tearful, joyous play both audiences rose to applaud a wonderful evening of pure theatre. We know the Stonesfield Players can put on a good evening of entertainment but this was something else. Jay Miller and Caroline Friend excelled as the two women incarcerated as morale imbeciles, the direction by Sally Wainwright was inspired. We laughed, we laughed a lot, none more so than when we witnessed the synchronised 'air swimming' routine. If this does become an Olympic Event in 2012 we have already seen the gold medal performance. It will surely become the next dance craze – well, maybe only in Stonesfield. On Saturday evening a meal was served prior to the

performance, and the food, the presentation, the waiters and waitresses were worth the ticket price alone. Reading the credits it was amazing to see how many of the Stonesfield Players were involved with the production, so well done to a bunch of amateurs who turned in a really professional performance.

Brilliant play, brilliant performance

Airschwimming was a night to remember. This was a dark, touching, often wonderfully funny play under Sally Wainwright's expert direction.

Staging was minimal, the stage furnished only with a short flight of stairs and an empty white bath, with cold lighting in the asylum and warmer in the council flat. So the whole weight of play and presentation fell on the acting, which did full justice to the needle-sharp, penetrating script. Jay and Caroline rendered the play with great sensitivity, reaching a depth and apparent simplicity which hid the unflinching work of achieving them. They realised two wildly different characters – Persephone simple, feeling, sensual, seemingly weak but sinewy too, escaping into identification with Doris Day; Dora apparently mannish but feeling too, a thwarted soldier, a persona which, though crumbling, she maintained to the end. We saw the two women ageing in the asylum over fifty years, together for one precious cleaning and polishing hour a day ('bath or stairs?') until finally they

were together for twenty-four hours every day, isolated again in the council flat.

The audience were never let off the hook, not least because the play moved in and out of simple time sequence. We were assaulted by pathos, social indignation, laughter and tragedy all at once. I feel that 'quality' is the best word to describe this whole production. Something in it reached out beyond the ordinary. It was in the play, the directing and acting, the stark staging and lighting, Ros Mengech's carefully devised drab costumes, the impeccable front of house arrangements under Brigitte Rak, the delicious meal provided on Saturday by Ros and helpers (served by waiters and waitresses last seen as bloodthirsty pirates in *Treasure Island*). It was in the black and silver balloons and table decorations in the hall. Nothing left out or overlooked. A big thank you to Sally, Jay and Caroline and everyone involved. It was a night to be remembered indeed.

They stayed in all sorts of different housing, including mobile homes. Starting in Los Angeles, they travelled to the Joshua Tree National Park. Next came Las Vegas, which they disliked intensely. Moving on, they visited Colorado, Utah, Montana and Idaho, their hosts including an attorney, a retired oyster farmer and, in Nevada, an alpaca farmer. In Yosemite National Park they saw giant redwoods and sequoias, many of them thousands of years old. They then travelled on to San Francisco, where they were fascinated by Chinatown. In all they stayed in twenty different homes during their journey across the USA.

Dear Friends,

I had not been to Lanzarote before so was not quite sure what to expect when we arrived for our summer holiday. Having just arrived home I have been reflecting on the experience. It is only fair to say that we all enjoyed ourselves and have returned feeling refreshed and relaxed. Mind you that latter feeling did not last for as long as I should have liked! Having said that I am not at all sure that I would want to go again. I have a feeling that I have seen all that there is to see and with the exception of a camel ride, experienced all that there is to experience.

At one point in the holiday we were subjected to some freak weather conditions. A wind blowing from the Sahara took daytime temperatures as high as 46° (that's 115° in old money).

There was one thing that struck me very forcibly. I am told that there is no water on the island and yet they manage to grow grapes and produce a more than acceptable wine. Over the centuries they have developed a method of capturing the early morning dew and using that to water the vines. It is quite remarkable and the vine-growing part of the island looks like nothing I had seen before, with pits dug into the lava surrounded by lava walls protecting each individual vine.

Human ingenuity is a remarkable thing. Here is an impossible situation and yet a way round has been found. The same could be said for the island as a whole. Why would you want to live in this volcanic, arid, hot and dusty place?

Unlike me, the tourist, for some this is home and questions about why do not

often arise. Some of us are fortunate enough to be able to choose the places we live with complete freedom. For most of us this is not the case. We are born in a place or move to it because it is near to our work. We use our human ingenuity to make the best possible job of where we are. I have always believed, even when I cannot clearly see, that God will want to use me in the place where I am. God will want me to offer all that I am, all of those gifts and talents he has bestowed on me, all of my ingenuity, to serve him.

I hope, like those vines on Lanzarote, I can flourish despite everything surrounding me that would prevent me from growing and coming to fruit. It is a great journey – why not come and join it?
